By Mr. Condon of Boston, petition of James F. Condon that the Department of Public Works be directed to reconstruct the railroad bridge on Dorchester Avenue at Kemp Street in the city of Boston. Highways and Motor Vehicles.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO RECONSTRUCT A CERTAIN BRIDGE IN THE CITY OF BOSTON IN ORDER TO ELIMINATE A TRAFFIC HAZARD LOCATED THEREON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The department of public works is hereby authorized and di-
2 rected to eliminate the traffic hazard which now exists on the
3 railroad bridge on Dorchester avenue at its intersection with
4 Kemp street in the city of Boston, by reconstructing said bridge.
5 Said hazard consists of dividing steel girders located in the center
6 of said bridge which has been the cause of many fatal accidents
7 and is a potential source of many more. For said purpose, the
8 department may expend such sums as may be appropriated
9 therefor.

THE CONSTITUTION

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 1. The legislative Power shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

No Person shall be Representative of this State unless he shall, when elected, have seven Years Residence in this State, and be seven Years of Age, and seven Years a Citizen of this State, and seven Years a Citizen of the United States before he be elected.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by adding to all free Persons, (including bound Persons for the Term of Years, and indentured Servants) three fifths of all other Persons who are held as Servants for Life, or for a Term of Years, and excluding Indians not taxed, but excluding
