AN ACT TO PROVIDE LIFE TENURE FOR DOROTHY F. SULLIVAN, DOROTHY M. VON HONE AND E. PHYLLIS WILSON, CLERKS IN THE OFFICE OF THE TREASURER OF THE TOWN OF WEST SPRINGFIELD.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The tenure of office of Dorothy F. Wilson,
2 Dorothy M. Von Hone, and E. Phyllis Wilson, clerks in the
3 office of the treasurer of the town of West Springfield shall,
4 upon the effective date of this act, be unlimited. Said in-
5 cumbents shall not be removed from office, lowered in rank
6 or suspended except for just cause and in the manner provided
7 by section forty-three of chapter thirty-one of the General
8 Laws.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall be submitted for acceptance
2 to the voters of said town at the annual town meeting to be
3 held in the year nineteen hundred and sixty-six in the form
4 of the following question, which shall be placed on the official
5 ballot to be used for the election of town officers at said
6 meeting:—“Shall an act passed by the General Court in
7 the year nineteen hundred and sixty-five entitled, ‘An Act
8 to provide life tenure for Dorothy F. Wilson, Dorothy M.
9 Von Hone and E. Phyllis Wilson, clerks in the office of the
10 treasurer of the town of West Springfield,’ be accepted?”
11 If a majority of the votes in answer to said question is in the
12 affirmative, then this act shall thereupon take full effect, but
13 not otherwise.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I. Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter such Regulations, except as to the Places of Elections.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall be held in the City of Washington, District of Columbia, and the Congress may determine the Time, Places and Manner of holding their Sessions, and may adjourn from Time to Time, and may, by Law, alter the Place of the meeting of the House of Representatives.
