

# HOUSE . . . . . No. 1191

By Mr. Schlosstein of Warren, petition of Frederick W. Schlosstein, Jr., that the Department of Public Works be directed to carry out a channel clearance project of the Quaboag River in the town of Warren. Harbors and Public Lands.

## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Six.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING AND DIRECTING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS TO CONDUCT A CHANNEL CLEARANCE PROJECT OF THE QUABOAG RIVER IN THE TOWN OF WARREN.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 The department of public works is hereby authorized and  
2 directed to carry out, through its division of waterways, sub-  
3 ject to appropriation and subject to the provisions of section  
4 eleven of chapter ninety-one of the General Laws, where ap-  
5 plicable, the following project for the improvement of the  
6 Quaboag river in the commonwealth: improvement and clear-  
7 ance of the channel of the Quaboag river in the town of Warren  
8 between the River Street bridge in the village of Warren and  
9 the mill dam next easterly of the South Street bridge in the vil-  
10 lage of West Warren, subject to the conditions that the town of  
11 Warren shall have assumed liability, in the manner provided by  
12 section twenty-nine of chapter ninety-one of the General Laws  
13 for all damages that may be incurred under said project, and  
14 has given the department of public works satisfactory assuran-  
15 ces that conditions imposed upon such municipality with  
26 respect to such projects shall be met.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE

Article I. Section 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Representatives.

Section 4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 5. The House of Representatives may determine the Rules and Proceedings of its own House, and may punish its Members for Disobedience of its Orders, for Disorderly Behaviour, and for Contumacious Refusal to answer any Question pertinent to its Business.

Section 6. The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments, when the House of Representatives shall have impeached; and no Proceedings shall be had, unless a Majority of the Senators present shall concur.

Section 7. The House of Representatives shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.

Section 8. The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes; to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to emit and put to Pass, and to receive and regulate the Value of Money, and to fix the Standard of Weights and Measures.
