RESOLVE IN FAVOR OF ROBERT CAULDWELL.

1 *Resolved*, That for the purpose of discharging a moral obli-
2 gation of the commonwealth, and subject to appropriation, there
3 be allowed and paid out of the state treasury to Robert Cauld-
4 well of North Attleborough the sum of one hundred and fifty
5 dollars as reimbursement for medical expenses incurred by him,
6 arising out of an injury sustained by him on July six, nineteen
7 hundred and sixty-five on which date he fell into a one foot deep
8 trench on East Washington street, North Attleborough. Said
9 trench was excavated by a crew of the department of public
10 works. No payment shall be made hereunder until there is
11 filed with the comptroller an agreement signed by the said Rob-
12 ert Cauldwell that the amount, if any, paid or to be paid for
13 legal services in connection with the passage of this resolve
14 shall not exceed ten percent of this sum.

The Constitution of Massachusetts

As amended to the 19th of March 1820

Chapter 15, Section 1

1. That the Executive, Legislative and Judicial Powers shall be separated and no one shall exercise more than one of them.
2. That the Executive Power shall be vested in a Governor, who shall hold office for one year, and shall be eligible for re-election.
3. That the Legislative Power shall be vested in a Senate and a House of Representatives.
4. That the Judicial Power shall be vested in a Supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as may be established by the Legislature.
5. That the Governor shall have the honor and privilege of the State, and shall be commander in chief of the Militia.
6. That the Governor shall have the power to pardon and reprieve, and to commute the punishment of criminals.
7. That the Governor shall have the power to appoint and remove officers of the State, and to grant commissions.
8. That the Governor shall have the power to call the Militia into service, and to direct their operations.
9. That the Governor shall have the power to declare a State of War, and to suspend the Habeas Corpus.
10. That the Governor shall have the power to grant Pardons, and to commute the Punishment of Criminals.
11. That the Governor shall have the power to appoint and remove officers of the State, and to grant commissions.
