## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Six.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR REIMBURSEMENT OF TUITION COSTS OF CHILDREN FROM RACIALLY IMBALANCED SCHOOLS TRANSFERRED TO OTHER DISTRICTS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. A resident of the commonwealth of Massa-  
2 chusetts who has a child enrolled in any school which has  
3 been determined by an appropriate Massachusetts govern-  
4 mental agency to be racially imbalanced shall have a right to  
5 apply in behalf of his minor child for the admission of his  
6 minor child to a school in a city or town other than that in  
7 which he resides, provided that the school to which he applies  
8 for admission is located not further than twenty miles from  
9 the school of enrollment of the child.

1 SECTION 2. The school department of such other munici-  
2 pality to which the application for admission has been made  
3 has the right to enroll such child in the school system of such  
4 other city or town and such other school department in which  
5 the child becomes enrolled pursuant hereto has the right to re-  
6 imbursement from the commonwealth for the cost of tuition  
7 for such child.

THE CHILDREN'S BENEVOLENCE SOCIETY ACT, 1907.

SECTION 1. That the children's benevolence society be and it is hereby established, to be organized and operated in accordance with the provisions of this act.

SECTION 2. That the children's benevolence society shall be a corporation of the State of New York, and shall have the same powers and capacities as a corporation under the laws of this State.

SECTION 3. That the children's benevolence society shall have the right to receive and hold real and personal property, to sue and be sued, to execute its trusts and powers, and to do all such other things as may be necessary or proper for the accomplishment of its objects.
