AN ACT TO REGULATE BARBER SCHOOLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 87P of chapter 112 of the General Laws is amended
- 2 by adding the following four new paragraphs to said section:—
- 3 No barber school or college shall admit any applicant unless
- 4 the applicant shall furnish satisfactory evidence of the comple-
- 5 tion of a high school education or its equivalent.
- 6 No barber school or college shall award any certificate to any
- 7 student or apprentice unless the student or apprentice has
- 8 satisfactorily completed fifteen hundred hours of instruction.
- 9 In each barber school or college there shall be no less than
- 10 one instructor for each eight students.
- 11 No person shall start a barber school or college or no certif-
- 12 icate shall be issued for any such school or college in any city
- 13 or town with less than two hundred and fifty thousand popula-
- 14 tion or within fifty miles radius of another barber school or
- 15 college.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE

ARTICLE I

SECTION 1

1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.
2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.
3. No Representative shall, when elected, be less than twenty five Years of Age, seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been seven Years a Citizen of that State.
4. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.
5. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.
6. The Senate shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Electors in each State.
7. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.
8. The Senate shall choose their President and Vice President; and when the President is absent, they shall choose a Vice President.
9. The President shall hold his Office for four Years, and shall be eligible for one Term only.
10. The President shall be Commander in Chief of the Army and Navy of the United States, and of the Militia of the several States, and may execute all the executive Powers vested in the President by this Constitution.
11. The President may grant Reprieves and Pardons for all Offenses, except Treason, Bribery, and other Crimes.
12. The President shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur.
13. The President shall nominate, and by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, shall appoint and dismiss Judges, Judges of the Supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are in his Power.
14. The President shall have Power to fill up all the Vacancies in the United States, which may happen during the Vacancy of the Office, by appointing Judges, Judges of the Supreme Court, and all other Officers of the United States, whose Appointments are in his Power.
15. The President shall have Power to grant Reprieves and Pardons for all Offenses, except Treason, Bribery, and other Crimes.
16. The President shall have Power, by and with the Advice and Consent of the Senate, to make Treaties, provided two thirds of the Senators present concur.
