AN ACT DESIGNATING MAY THIRTIETH MEMORIAL DAY AND NOVEMBER ELEVENTH AS VETERANS DAY.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 7 of chapter 4 of the General Laws is
2 hereby amended by striking out clause Eighteenth, as most
3 recently amended by section 1 of chapter 24 of the acts of
4 1969, and inserting in place thereof the following clause: —

5 Eighteenth, "Legal Holiday" shall include January first, July
6 fourth and Christmas Day, or the day following when any of
7 said days occur on Sunday, and the third Monday in February,
8 the third Monday in April, May thirtieth, the first Monday in
9 September, the second Monday in October, November eleventh,
10 and Thanksgiving day. "Legal Holiday" shall also include, with
11 respect to Suffolk county only, March seventeenth and June
12 seventeenth, or the day following when said days occur on
13 Sunday; provided, however, that the words "Legal Holiday" as
14 used in section forty-five of chapter one hundred and forty-
15 nine shall not include March seventeenth, or the day following
16 when said day occurs on Sunday.

1 SECTION 2. Section 12A of chapter 6, inserted by chapter
2 661 of the acts of 1954, is hereby amended by striking out, in
3 line 2, the words "fourth Monday in October" and inserting in
4 place thereof the words: — November eleventh.
