AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE STRIKING OF ARREST RECORD AFTER ACQUITTAL.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 A person may file a petition with the Chief Judge of the
- 2 Criminal Court stating that he was arrested and acquitted and
- 3 desires to have his arrest record expunged. If fingerprints and
- 4 photographs were taken, they shall be returned to him by the
- 5 chief of police.
