

HOUSE No. 1904

By Messrs. Keenan of Boston and Mulligan of Boston, petition of William Francis Keenan and Robert J. Mulligan that the Metropolitan District Commission be directed to control and maintain a portion of River Street and Adams Street in the city of Boston. Metropolitan Affairs.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE CONTROL AND MAINTENANCE BY THE METROPOLITAN DISTRICT COMMISSION OF THAT PORTION OF RIVER STREET IN THE CITY OF BOSTON FROM MATTAPAN SQUARE TO PIERCE STREET AND THAT PORTION OF ADAMS STREET FROM PIERCE SQUARE TO GALLIVAN BOULEVARD.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 That portion of River street in the city of Boston from Mattapan square to Pierce street and that portion of Adams street in
- 2 said city from Pierce square to Gallivan boulevard shall be con-
- 3 trolled and maintained by the metropolitan district commission.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION

AMENDMENT NO. 13

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are hereby declared to be citizens of the United States.

Section 2. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall discriminate against any person because he is a foreign-born citizen of the United States, or on account of race or color, or on account of his religious beliefs or opinions.

AMENDMENT NO. 14

Section 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are hereby declared to be citizens of the United States.

Section 2. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall discriminate against any person because he is a foreign-born citizen of the United States, or on account of race or color, or on account of his religious beliefs or opinions.

AMENDMENT NO. 15

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race or color.

Section 2. No State shall deny the right to vote to any male citizen of the United States, who is twenty-one years of age, and who is not incapable of managing his own affairs, on account of his race or color.
