AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE RIGHT TO DRIVE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 90 of the General Laws is hereby amended by the
2 insertion of section 8D immediately following section 8C as
3 most recently added by Chapter 766 of the Acts of 1973 as
4 follows:

5 *Section 8D.* The Registrar shall not revoke, suspend or
6 otherwise alter the privileges represented by any license
7 granted pursuant to this Chapter unless the holder of such
8 license shall have been convicted of a violation of this chapter
9 by a court of competent jurisdiction for which revocation or
10 suspension is subsequently provided or unless the holder of
11 such license shall have been adjudicated physically or mentally
12 incompetent by a court of competent jurisdiction. Any revo-
13 cation, suspension or refusal to review any license to operate
14 which is not preceded by a conviction of a violation of this
15 Chapter as provided in this section shall be null, void and of
16 no effect. Any operator may apply to the nearest District
17 Court for an order directed to the Registrar to issue any
18 license which is suspended, revoked or refused in violation of
19 this section. Such order shall be granted upon application by
20 the District Court unless or until the Registrar or his repre-
21 sentative shall produce a record of conviction of violation of
22 a Section of this Chapter for which suspension or revocation
23 is required. A copy of the order of the District Court shall be
24 the equivalent of a license until the Registrar is able to supply
25 a standard license to the operator.

By the Clerk of the Senate, a petition presented on the Senate floor, in support of the bill, and a report thereon, was read and referred to the Committee on Education and the Arts, and the bill was referred to the Committee on Education and the Arts.
