AN ACT TO PERMIT REDEVELOPMENT AUTHORITIES TO MAKE REHABILITATION GRANTS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 59, of Chapter 121B, as amended, as
2 inserted by Chapter 751 of the Acts of 1969, shall be amended by
3 inserting the words "and grants" in paragraph 2, line 8, therefore,
4 after the words "... shall have the power to make mortgage loans",
5 and before the words "... for the purpose of financing the
6 rehabilitation of dwellings ..."

1 SECTION 2. Section 59, of Chapter 121B, as amended, as
2 inserted by Chapter 751 of the Acts of 1969, shall further be
3 amended by inserting the words "or grant" in paragraph 5, line 3,
4 thereof, after the words "... during the period any mortgage loan
5 ...", and before the words "... made under this section to finance
6 such rehabilitation ...".

The Constitution of the United States

As amended by the Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, and Nineteenth Amendments

It is hereby certified that the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America have approved the Constitution of the United States as amended by the Thirteenth, Fourteenth, Fifteenth, and Nineteenth Amendments.

ARTICLE I. Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives. Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States; and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature. Section 3. Representatives and Electors shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

ARTICLE II. Section 1. The executive Power shall be vested in a President of the United States. Section 2. The President shall hold his Office for a Term of Years, which shall be determined by Law. Section 3. The President shall be elected by the Electors in each State.
