**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventy-Six.

AN ACT PROVIDING THAT REPRESENTATIVES OF CHARITABLE ORGANIZATIONS SHALL NOT BE SUBJECT TO CERTAIN LAWS REGULATING LOBBYING AND LEGISLATIVE AGENTS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

Chapter 3 of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out section 50, as most recently amended by chapter 382 of the acts of 1974, and inserting in place thereof the following section:—

5 *Section 50.* Sections thirty-nine to forty-nine, inclusive, shall  
6 not apply to any representative of a charitable organization or to  
7 employees or agents of the commonwealth or of a city, town,  
8 district or regional school district who are acting in their capacity  
9 as such employees or agents or to any person requested to appear  
10 before any committee or commission of the general court by a  
11 majority of the members of such committee or commission;  
12 provided, that such person performs no other act to influence  
13 legislation; and provided, further, that the name of such person  
14 be recorded in the official records of such committee or  
15 commission.

THE CANTONMENT ACT

Approved February 11, 1903.

AN ACT TO PROVIDE FOR THE CANTONMENT OF MILITARY AND NAVAL FORCES AND TO DEFINE THE RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF THE RESIDENTS OF SUCH CANTONMENTS.

Section 1. That the President may, in his discretion, designate any of the lands owned or controlled by the United States as a military or naval cantonment.

Section 2. That the President may, in his discretion, designate any of the lands owned or controlled by the United States as a military or naval cantonment, and may, in his discretion, determine the limits of such cantonment.

Section 3. That the President may, in his discretion, determine the rights and duties of the residents of such cantonments, and may, in his discretion, determine the conditions of residence in such cantonments.
