Chap. 436. AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE GROUP INSURANCE COMMISSION.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Section 3 of chapter 32A of the General Laws is hereby amended by striking out the first two sentences, as amended by chapter 958 of the acts of 1977, and inserting in place thereof the following two sentences:- There shall be established within the executive office for administration and finance, but not under its jurisdiction, a special unpaid commission, to be known as the group insurance commission, consisting of the commissioner of administration and finance, the commissioner of insurance, and nine members to be appointed by the governor, one of whom shall be a retired state employee, and at least three of whom shall be full time state employees, one of whom shall be a member of the Massachusetts Public Employees Council, #93, AFSCME, AFL-CIO, one of whom shall be a member of the Massachusetts State Employees Association, NAGE, one of whom shall be a member of Local 254, S.E.I.U., AFL-CIO, and one of whom shall be a health economist. Not more than five appointive members of the commission shall be members of the same political party.

Chap. 437. AN ACT ENLARGING THE POWERS OF CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE PAROLE BOARD APPOINTED AS SPECIAL STATE POLICE OFFICERS.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Section 127 of chapter 127 of the General Laws, as most recently amended by chapter 754 of the acts of 1965, is hereby further amended by adding the following sentence:- Such special state police officers of the parole board may also perform police duties: (1) when on official duty as a parole officer and in the company of an on-duty police officer or state police officer during the course of such police officers official duties; (2) to serve arrest warrants issued by any court in the commonwealth for the arrest of any person charged with any crime; and (3) when arresting parolees pursuant to warrants or detainers of the parole board or transporting said parolees, over individuals who attempt or threaten to interfere with such special
