

SENATE No. 993

By Mr. Rogers, a petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 993) of George Rogers for legislation to prevent the practice of law by attorneys who are members of the General Court under certain circumstances. Rules (Joint).

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

AN ACT PREVENTING THE PRACTICE OF LAW BY ATTORNEYS WHO ARE MEMBERS OF THE GENERAL COURT UNDER CERTAIN CIRCUMSTANCES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Notwithstanding the provisions of any general or special
- 2 law to the contrary, any member of the General Court, while
- 3 he serves a term to which he was elected, shall be prohibited
- 4 from practicing law before any state agency or court.

By Mr. Rogers, a petition was presented by Bill Howell, No. 908, of the House for legislation to amend the charter of the Board of Health and the members of the General Court under certain circumstances. (Title 10, Chapter 100.)
