AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE APPOINTMENT OF CHARLES H. LOUD TO THE POLICE FORCE OF THE TOWN OF EASTHAMPTON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding the provision of any law to the
2 contrary, for the purpose of certifying names from the current
3 eligible list provided to the appointing authority for the Town of
4 Easthampton for appointment to the police force of said town
5 pursuant to section forty-eight A of Chapter thirty-one of the
6 General Laws, the personnel administrator shall treat and consider
7 Charles H. Loud who resides in the Town of Southamton, as
8 though said Charles H. Loud had in fact resided in the Town of
9 Easthampton for one year next preceding the date of the
10 examination which resulted in the establishment of said list.

1 SECTION 2. Notwithstanding the provision of any law to the
2 contrary, the Town of Easthampton is hereby authorized to grant
3 Civil Service status, in accordance with section forty-seven A of
4 Chapter thirty-one of the General Laws, to Charles H. Loud as a
5 member of the police department of said town.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

SECTION 1. SECTION 2. SECTION 3. The House of Representatives shall choose their Speaker and other Officers; and shall have the sole Power of Impeachment.
