By Mr. Scibelli of Springfield, petition of Theodore E. Dimauro, Anthony M. Scibelli and other members of the House (with the approval of the mayor and city council) that the position of superintendent of public parks and recreation in the city of Springfield be exempt from the civil service law. Public Service. [Local Approval Received.]

AN ACT PROVIDING THAT THE POSITION OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC PARKS AND RECREATION IN THE CITY OF SPRINGFIELD BE EXEMPT FROM CIVIL SERVICE LAW.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The position of Superintendent of Public Parks
2 and Recreation in the Park Department of the City of Springfield
3 shall be exempt from the provisions of chapter thirty one of the
4 General Laws.

1 SECTION 2. The provisions of section one of this act shall not
2 impair the Civil Service status of any incumbent holding Civil
3 Service status in the position described in section one, at the time of
4 the enactment of this act.

1 SECTION 3. The Superintendent of Public Parks and Recrea-
2 tion shall be appointed, and be subject to removal in the same
3 manner as the head of a city department under the city charter of
4 Springfield.
