AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE ADMINISTRATION OF THE DISTRICT COURTS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special law to  
2 the contrary, the position of Court Procedure Clerk and ap-  
3 propriation for said position, in the Clerk/Magistrate's Office  
4 of the Natick District Court is hereby transferred to the  
5 Clerk/Magistrate's Office of the Third District Court of East-  
6 ern Middlesex.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect October 1, 1982.
