AN ACT CLARIFYING PENSION RIGHTS FOR JUDGES RENDERING JUDICIAL SERVICES ON RECALL AFTER RETIREMENT DATE.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Section 65G of chapter 32 of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by striking out paragraph (c) and inserting in place  
3 thereof the following paragraph: —

4 (c) If such retired justice no longer wishes to be eligible  
5 to perform judicial duties or if his recall status is terminated  
6 without renewal, pursuant to said section fourteen of chapter  
7 two hundred and eleven B, he may at any time after having  
8 his name placed upon a retired list resign his office, and  
9 thereafter he or his surviving spouse shall be, and continue  
10 to be, entitled to receive a pension based upon the annual  
11 salary rate he was last receiving as a recalled justice, not-  
12 withstanding any other law to the contrary.
