## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Eighty-three.

### AN ACT EXEMPTING STUDENTS EMPLOYED IN ORGANIZED CAMPS FROM EMPLOYMENT UNDER THE EMPLOYMENT SECURITY LAW.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Section 6 of Chapter 151 A of the General Laws,  
2 as most recently amended by chapter 720 of the acts of 1977,  
3 is hereby further amended by adding the following new sub-  
4 section:—

5 (x) Service performed by a full-time student as defined in  
6 section 3306(q) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 in the  
7 employ of an organized camp if such camp (A) did not oper-  
8 ate for more than seven months in the calendar year and did  
9 not operate for more than seven months in the preceding  
10 calendar year, or (B) had average gross receipts for any six  
11 months in the preceding calendar year which were not more  
12 than 33 1/3 percent of its average receipts for the other six  
13 months in the preceding year; and if such full-time student  
14 performed services in the employ of such camp for less than  
15 thirteen calendar weeks in such calendar year.

1 SECTION 2. The amendments made by this Act shall apply  
2 only to remuneration paid after December 31, 1982 and before  
3 January 1, 1984.
