Emilio and another relative to the establishment of standards for the collection, use and disclosure and privacy of information concerning insurance transactions; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1393) of Stanley C. Rosenberg and John W. Olver for legislation to authorize the University of Massachusetts to purchase certain insurance; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1773) of Mary Jane Gibson, John C. McNeil, William P. Nagle, Jr., and Susan C. Tucker for legislation to establish a system of compensation for injuries related to medical treatment; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2442) of Joseph K. Mackey, Marjorie A. Clapprood and A. Stephen Tobin for legislation to further regulate the sale of mass marketed life and health insurance; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 2644) of Lawrence R. Alexander and other members of the General Court for legislation to further protect elderly persons in meeting health care and life insurance needs; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 3036) of Francis H. Woodward for legislation to regulate refunds on motor vehicle insurance policies; the petition (accompanied by resolve, House, No. 4234) of Francis H. Woodward and another for an investigation by a special commission (including members of the General Court) relative to the utilization and cost effectiveness of mandated health care benefits; and the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 4901) of David B. Cohen for legislation to regulate HIV-related testing in determining eligibility for health care insurance, reports the accompanying order (Senate, No. 2094).
