By Mr. Businger of Brookline, petition of Walter J. Ziobro, Jr., for legislation to permit voters to sign more than one nomination petition for the same office. Election Laws.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

AN ACT ALLOWING VOTERS TO SIGN MORE THAN ONE NOMINATION PETITION FOR THE SAME OFFICE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 7 of chapter 53 of the General Laws, as
2 appearing in the 1988 Official Edition, is hereby amended by
3 striking out the first paragraph and inserting in place thereof the
4 following paragraph: —

5 Section 7. Every voter signing a nomination paper shall sign
6 in person as registered or substantially as registered, and shall state
7 the address where he currently is living with street and number,
8 if any, and his address on January first preceding, if different, but
9 any voter who is prevented by physical disability from writing may
10 authorize some person to write his name and residence in his
11 presence.

1 SECTION 2. Section 45 of said Chapter 53, as so appearing,
2 is hereby amended by striking out lines 16 through 18, inclusive,
3 and inserting in place thereof the following sentence: —
4 Signatures shall be subject to section seven.
