AN ACT RELATIVE TO ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES CONTROL COMMISSION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 43 of Chapter 6 of the General Laws, as most recently
- 2 amended by Chapter 699, Section 3 of the Acts of 1981 is amended
- 3 by substituting the following words in the first paragraph:
- 4 In line two change the word "two" to "four"; in line 3 change
- 5 the word "two" to "three"; in line 4 change the word "one" to
- 6 "two"; in line 6 change the word "one" to "two".
- 7 Said section 43 is further amended by adding the following
- 8 sentence to the first paragraph: At all times, one member of the
- 9 commission shall be a licensee within the meaning of Chapter 138
- 10 of the General Laws. For purposes of this section a majority
- 11 shareholder in, or an officer of, a corporation or other business
- 12 entity holding a license shall be deemed a "licensee".
