AN ACT REGARDING PETITIONS FOR PROBATE; AFFIDAVIT OF KNOWLEDGE.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter 192, section 1 of the General Laws as most recently
2 amended by St. 1987, Chapter 557, is hereby amended by striking
3 the entire section and inserting in place thereof the following new
4 section:

5 A petition for the probate of a will, letters of administration,
6 or letters testamentary shall have annexed an affidavit, signed
7 under the penalties of perjury, of the petitioner or one of the
8 petitioners that the statements therein made are true to the best
9 of his knowledge and belief.
