By Mr. Alexander of Marblehead, petition of Lawrence R. Alexander (by vote of the town) that the town of Swampscott be authorized to issue estimated tax bills. Taxation. [Local Approval Received.]

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TOWN OF SWAMPSCOTT TO ISSUE ESTIMATED TAX BILLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any general or special law to the
2 contrary, the town of Swampscott is hereby authorized to issue real
3 estate and personal property tax bills for any fiscal year the town so
4 votes which are based upon a tax rate to be estimated by the board
5 of assessors of said town, provided, however, that the amount of
6 the tax bills issued for the first half of any such fiscal year shall not
7 exceed the amount of the tax bills said town issued for the first half
8 of the preceeding fiscal year.

1 SECTION 2. Taxes owed pursuant to tax bills issued under
2 section one shall be collected in the manner provided in chapter
3 fifty-nine of the General Laws.

1 SECTION 3. Nothing contained herein shall limit a taxpayer's
2 right to apply for an abatement of said tax or such other relief
3 provided for in section fifty-nine of said chapter fifty-nine.
