
By Mr. Adlow of Boston, petition of Elijah Adlow for the nomination and election under political designations of mayor and councillors in the city of Boston. Election Laws. Sept. 21, 1925.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Six.

An Act providing for the Nomination and Election by Political Designations of Mayor and Councillors in the City of Boston.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Beginning in the year nineteen hundred
2 and twenty-seven a municipal primary in the city of
3 Boston shall take place biennially in every odd num-
4 bered year on the Tuesday after the first Monday in
5 September, at which the different political parties recog-
6 nized by law shall nominate their candidates for the
7 offices to be filled at the election, which shall be held
8 biennially in every odd numbered year on the Tuesday
9 after the first Monday in November.

1 SECTION 2. The rules and provisions of law applying
2 to primaries and elections for state officers shall apply
3 to municipal primaries and elections in the city of
4 Boston; provided, however, that in order for a candi-
5 date to have his name placed upon the official ballot in
6 any primary he shall be required to file with the election
7 commissioners of Boston nomination papers containing
8 the signatures, in the case of the mayor, of three thousand

9 registered and qualified voters, and in the case of the
10 councillors, one hundred registered and qualified voters.
11 Such registered and qualified voters shall be of the same
12 party designation as the candidates whose nomination
13 they endorse.

1 SECTION 3. All acts and parts of acts so far as they
2 are inconsistent with this act are hereby repealed.

1 SECTION 4. This act shall not apply to the election
2 of members of the Boston school committee.
