

HOUSE No. 581

By Mr. McMorrow of Boston, petition of William M. McMorrow for legislation to increase the exemption from taxation upon household furniture. Taxation.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty.

An Act to increase the Exemption upon Household Furniture from One Thousand Dollars to Two Thousand Dollars.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The twentieth clause of section five
2 of chapter fifty-nine of the General Laws is hereby
3 amended by striking out the words "one thousand
4 dollars" in line three thereof and substituting in
5 place thereof the words:— two thousand dollars,—
6 so that said paragraph will read as follows:— Twen-
7 tieth, The wearing apparel and farming utensils of
8 every person; his household furniture used in the
9 dwelling which is the place of his domicile not ex-
10 ceeding two thousand dollars in value; and the
11 necessary tools of a mechanic not exceeding three
12 hundred dollars in value.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.

The Constitution of the United States
