

HOUSE No. 826

By Mr. Coffey of Boston, petition of James S. Coffey and Richard D. Gleason for legislation to provide that when boxing or sparring matches are declared to be no contest tickets shall be issued to attendants entitling them to free admission to the next match. Public Safety.

An Act to regulate the Conduct of Boxing Matches.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Chapter one hundred and forty-seven of the Gen-
2 eral Laws is hereby amended by inserting after sec-
3 tion forty-one the following new section:—
4 *Section 41A.* If during the conduct of any boxing
5 or sparring match the main bout as advertised is
6 declared by the referee to be no contest, the licensee
7 shall issue to each person in attendance at said match
8 a ticket entitling him to free admission with the right
9 to occupy the seat called for by the stub of his original
10 ticket to the next forthcoming boxing or sparring
11 match conducted by the said licensee.
