By Mr. Edward J. Kelley of Worcester, petition of Edward J. Kelley relative to method of payment of salaries of the commissioners of the Department of Public Utilities and of certain expenses of said department. State Administration.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Five.

An Act relative to the Method of Payment of Salaries of Members of the Commission on Public Utilities and of Certain Salaries and Expenses incurred by the Department of Public Utilities in the Performance of Certain of its Functions.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Sections eleven and twelve of chapter twenty-five
- 2 of the General Laws are hereby repealed.

HOUSE No. 281

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

Article I
Section 1
All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2
The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 3
The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 4
The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or add to the Rules and Regulations therefor.

Section 5
The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin at Noon on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by Law provide otherwise.

Section 6
The Senators and Representatives shall receive Compensation for their Services, as well as Allowances for Expenses actually incurred by them in the Discharge of their Duties, which shall be paid from the Treasury of the United States; but they shall in no Case receive any other Emolument from the United States, or any State.

Section 7
The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes; to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States, to emit and put to Pass, and to receive and regulate the Value of Money, and to fix the Standard of Weights and Measures.

Section 8
In addition to the Powers before mentioned, the Congress shall have Power to make all Laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into Execution the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States, or in any Department or Officer thereof.

Section 9
The Privilege of the Writ of Habeas Corpus shall not be suspended, unless when in Cases of Rebellion or Invasion the public Safety may require it.

Section 10
No State shall enter into any Treaty, Alliance, or Confederation; grant Letters of Marque and Reprisal; enter into any War, unless actually attacked; keep Troops or Ships of War in peacetime; enter into any Agreement with a foreign Power for the Transfer of Territory; or grant any Title of Nobility.

Section 11
The President and Vice President shall hold their Offices for four Years; and, together with the Senators and Representatives, shall be chosen in the Manner provided in the next Article.

Section 12
The Electors shall meet in one or more Cities, which shall have the Qualification requisite for Electors in the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 13
The Electors in each State shall have the Qualification requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 14
The Electors shall vote by Ballot, and the Votes shall be sealed, and the Names of the Electors in each State shall be written on the Ballots, which shall be put in a Box, and kept until the Votes are opened.

Section 15
The Electors shall meet in one or more Cities, which shall have the Qualification requisite for Electors in the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.

Section 16
The Electors shall vote by Ballot, and the Votes shall be sealed, and the Names of the Electors in each State shall be written on the Ballots, which shall be put in a Box, and kept until the Votes are opened.
