## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Thirty-Eight.

### AN ACT TO FURTHER REGULATE THE PENAL SUM OF THE BOND REQUIRED FOR BOXING LICENSES.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Section thirty-four of chapter one hundred and  
2 forty-seven of the General Laws is hereby amended  
3 by striking out the words appearing in the third line  
4 of said section, namely, "five thousand dollars" and  
5 inserting in place and instead thereof the words:—  
6 five hundred dollars, — and by striking out the words  
7 appearing in the twelfth line of said section, namely,  
8 "one thousand dollars" and inserting in place and  
9 instead thereof the words:— one hundred dollars, —  
10 so as to read as follows:— *Section 34.* No license as  
11 aforesaid shall be granted unless the licensee has exe-  
12 cuted and filed with the commission a bond in a  
13 penal sum of five hundred dollars, with such surety  
14 or sureties as shall be satisfactory to the commission,  
15 running to the commission, conditioned upon the pay-

16 ment to the commonwealth of the sums mentioned in  
17 section forty, and upon faithful compliance by the  
18 licensee with the provisions of sections thirty-two to  
19 forty-seven, inclusive, the rules and regulations of  
20 the commission, and with such other laws of the com-  
21 monwealth as may be applicable to anything done  
22 by the licensee in pursuance of the license. The bond  
23 shall also provide for a forfeiture to the common-  
24 wealth, recoverable at the suit of the attorney gen-  
25 eral, of such sum, not exceeding one hundred dollars,  
26 as may be stipulated in the bond for each case of  
27 non compliance.
