The committee on Taxation, to whom was referred the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 444) of Charles V. Hogan that the time be extended within which certain soldiers and sailors and their wives, widows, fathers or mothers may file applications for abatement or exemption of taxes; the petition (accompanied by bill, Senate, No. 451) of John E. Powers and John W. Coddaire, Jr., for legislation to further exempt certain property of disabled veterans from taxation; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 241) of William T. Shinnick and others that certain blind veterans be exempt from the payment of motor vehicle excise taxes and registration fees and relative to the furnishing to them of special automobile plates; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 374) of James R. Doncaster relative to exempting for tax purposes disability retirement pay of former officers of the armed forces; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 544) of Charles S. Marston, 3rd, relative to exempting from taxation property of disabled veterans and for relieving such veterans from the submission of evidence of injuries or disabilities; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 545) of Frank D. McCarthy for legislation to further exempt from taxation property of certain disabled veterans; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1129) of Coleman C. Curran, Richard A. Ruether and another that certain property of disabled veterans be exempt from taxation; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1130) of Coleman C. Curran,

Richard A. Ruether and another relative to exemptions from taxation granted to soldiers, sailors, their wives, widows, fathers or mothers; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1131) of Coleman C. Curran, Richard A. Ruether and another relative to certain exemptions from taxation granted to veterans, their wives, widows and parents; the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1600) of Louis H. Glaser for legislation relative to tax exemptions for certain disabled veterans; and the petition (accompanied by bill, House, No. 1621) of Roy Ciras and another for legislation to further exempt from taxation certain property of disabled veterans, report the accompanying Resolve (Senate, No. 532).

RESOLVE INCREASING THE SCOPE OF THE INVESTIGATION
AND STUDY OF THE SPECIAL COMMISSION ON TAXATION.

1 *Resolved*, That the unpaid special commission,
2 known as the special commission on taxation, estab-
3 lished by chapter eighty-six of the resolves of nineteen
4 hundred and forty-eight, and most recently continued
5 by chapter sixty-eight of the resolves of nineteen hun-
6 dred and fifty-one, shall, in making its investigation
7 and study of the problems of taxation, consider the
8 subject matter of current senate documents numbered
9 444 and 451, and current house documents numbered
10 241, 374, 544, 545, 1129, 1130, 1131, 1600 and 1621.
