AN ACT PLACING CERTAIN EMPLOYEES OF THE STATE RACING COMMISSION UNDER CIVIL SERVICE LAWS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 48 of chapter 6 of the General
2 Laws, as amended, is hereby amended by striking out
3 the last paragraph and inserting in place thereof the
4 following new paragraph: —

5 The commission may appoint a secretary and other
6 assistants. The offices or positions of secretary, chief
7 accountant, semi-senior accountant, supervising racing
8 inspector, assistant supervising racing inspector, prin-
9 cipal clerk, senior clerk and stenographer, and junior
10 clerk and stenographer, or other full-time positions of
11 similar grades, shall be subject to the provisions of
12 chapter thirty-one and the rules made thereunder. All
13 other assistants shall be exempt from the provisions
14 of chapter thirty-one.

1 SECTION 2. Upon the effective date of this act,
2 the term of office of the incumbents of the offices or
3 positions placed under chapter thirty-one, shall be
4 unlimited, subject, however, to said laws and rules,
5 provided, however, that the incumbents of said offices
6 or positions, may continue to serve in such offices or

7 positions provided they pass a qualifying examination
8 to which they shall be subjected by the division of
9 civil service. Upon passing said examination, said in-
10 cumbents of said offices or positions shall be deemed
11 to be permanently appointed to said offices or posi-
12 tions without serving any probationary period.
