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**The Commonwealth of Massachusetts**

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In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Two.

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RESOLVE PROVIDING FOR AN INVESTIGATION AND STUDY BY A SPECIAL COMMISSION RELATIVE TO PROVIDING FOR THE LOCATION AND ESTABLISHMENT OF THE JOHN F. KENNEDY LIBRARY WITHIN THE COMMONWEALTH.

1 *Resolved*, That an unpaid special commission, to consist of five  
2 members of the senate to be designated by the president thereof,  
3 seven members of the house of representatives to be designated  
4 by the speaker thereof, and two persons to be appointed by the  
5 governor, is hereby established for the purpose of making an  
6 investigation and study relative to providing for the location  
7 and establishment of the John F. Kennedy Library at a suitable  
8 site within the commonwealth for the purpose of maintaining  
9 for posterity the papers, documents and books of President  
10 John F. Kennedy and in connection therewith to consider the  
11 location, type of structure and methods of financing.

12 Said commission shall be provided with quarters in the state  
13 house or elsewhere, may travel within and without the common-  
14 wealth, may hold hearings, and may expend for expert, clerical  
15 and other assistance and expenses such sums as may be appro-  
16 priated therefor. Said commission shall report to the general  
17 court the results of its investigation and study, and its recom-  
18 mendations, if any, together with drafts of legislation necessary  
19 to carry its recommendations into effect, by filing the same with  
20 the clerk of the house of representatives on or before the fourth  
21 Wednesday of December in the current year.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be admitted to or separated from the Union, according to their respective Numbers, which shall be determined by the following Rule, to-wit: All free Persons, (including Indians not taxed) in every State shall be counted three fifths of a Person for Representatives and direct Taxes.

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
