The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Two.

AN ACT PERTAINING TO THE SALARIES OF THE JUSTICES OF THE MUNICIPAL COURT OF THE CITY OF BOSTON.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 218 of the General Laws is hereby
2 amended by striking out section 75, as most recently amended
3 by section 1 of chapter 748 of the acts of 1955, and inserting
4 in place thereof the following section:—

5 *Section 75.* The salary of the chief justice of the municipal
6 court of the city of Boston shall be nineteen thousand dollars,
7 and the salary of each of the associate justices shall be eighteen
8 thousand dollars. Such justices shall devote their entire time
9 during ordinary business hours to their respective duties and
10 shall not, directly or indirectly, engage in the practice of law.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect as of the first day of
2 January, nineteen hundred and sixty-two.
