AN ACT DIRECTING THE AIRPORT MANAGEMENT BOARD TO PROVIDE DEVICES TO CONTROL THE POLLUTION OF AIR BY EMISSION OF GASES AND FUMES FROM JET AIRCRAFT IN THE EAST BOSTON PERIMETER OF THE LOGAN INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

- 1 Section 59A of chapter 6 of the General Laws is hereby
- 2 amended by adding at the end thereof the following paragraph:—
- 3 The board is hereby directed to provide suitable controls,
- 4 devices and limited forestation in order to reduce and control
- 5 the pollution and contamination of the air and atmosphere by
- 6 reason of the emission and discharge of gases, fumes and hydro-
- 7 carbon exhaust from jet and other aircraft operating in the East
- 8 Boston perimeter of the Logan International Airport.

The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature of the State in which they may be, and they shall hold their Offices for six Years, and until their Successors be chosen.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or amend such Regulations.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin on the first Monday in December, but they may adjourn from time to time, and may extend the last Day of the same to any Day within the following Year.

Section 6. The Senators and Representatives shall receive a Compensation for their Services, which shall be ascertained from Time to Time by the Congress.

Section 7. The Congress shall have Power to lay and collect Taxes, Duties, Imposts and Excises, to regulate Commerce with foreign Nations, among the several States, and with the Indian Tribes; to borrow Money on the Credit of the United States; to emit and put out the Money of the United States; to regulate the Value of Money; to fix the Standard of Weights and Measures; to coin Money, to regulate the Value thereof, and to make such other Laws as may be necessary and proper to carry out the foregoing Powers, and all other Powers vested by this Constitution in the Government of the United States.
