HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES, March 27, 1894.

The committee on the Liquor Law, to whom was referred the petition of Horace D. King and others for an amendment to section 1 of chapter 100 of the Public Statutes relating to the sale of intoxicating liquors (accompanied by House, No. 63), the petition of John J. McCoy and others for legislation restricting or preventing the manufacture and sale of cider and wine containing more than two per cent. of alcohol, and the petition (with accompanying bill, House, No. 204) of John J. Whipple for an amendment of the law relative to the sale of intoxicating liquors, so as to place greater restrictions upon the sale of cider and native wines, report the accompanying Bill.

### AN ACT

Relative to the Sale of Cider and Native Wines.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

- 1 Section one of chapter one hundred of the Public
- 2 Statutes is hereby amended by inserting after the word
- 3 "thereof," in the fifth line the words: "in quantities of
- 4 not less than ten gallons," so as to read as follows:—
- 5 *Section 1.* No person shall sell, or expose or keep
- 6 for sale, spirituous or intoxicating liquor, except as
- 7 authorized in this chapter; but nothing herein contained
- 8 shall apply to sales made by a person under a provision
- 9 of law requiring him to sell personal property, or to
- 10 sales of cider and of native wines by the makers thereof
- 11 in quantities of not less than ten gallons, not to be
- 12 drunk on their premises.
