Bill accompanying the petition of Charles J. McNulty relative to establishing the salaries of the justices, clerk and first assistant clerk of the municipal court of the Charlestown district of the city of Boston. Public Service. January 15.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventeen.

AN ACT

Relative to the Salaries of the Justice, Clerk and First Assistant Clerk of the Municipal Court of the Charlestown District of the City of Boston.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The annual salary of the justice of the
2 municipal court of the Charlestown district of the city of
3 Boston shall be three thousand five hundred dollars.

1 SECTION 2. The annual salaries of the clerk and first
2 assistant clerk of the municipal court of the Charlestown
3 district of the city of Boston shall be as follows:— clerk,
4 two thousand one hundred dollars; first assistant clerk,
5 one thousand four hundred dollars.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

AN ACT

TO AMEND THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

IN THE SEVENTH ARTICLE

SECTION 1

The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one Supreme Court, and in such inferior Courts as the Congress may from time to time ordain and establish. The Judges, both of the Supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at any time during their Continuance in Office, be removable by Impeachment.

SECTION 2

The judicial Power shall extend to all Cases arising under this Constitution, to all Cases of Law and Equity, to all Cases affecting Ambassadors, Consuls, and other public Ministers and Consuls, to all Cases of Admiralty and Maritime Jurisdiction, to all Cases of Controversy between two or more States, between a State and Citizens of another State, between Citizens of different States, between Citizens of the same State claiming Lands under Grants of different States, and between a State and foreign Citizens, Subjects or Companies.

SECTION 3

Treason against the United States, shall consist only in levying War against them, or in adhering to their Enemies, giving them Aid and Comfort. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless he shall have declared War against the United States, or given Aid and Comfort to their Enemies, in actual Hostility to them. No Person shall be convicted of Treason unless on the Oath of a Majority of both Houses of Congress, joined by a two thirds Majority of each.

SECTION 4

The Congress shall have Power to declare the Punishment of Treason, but no Attainder of Treason shall work Corruption of Blood, or forfeiture of Estate, against the Heirs of the convicted Party.

SECTION 5

The Congress shall have Power to regulate the Commerce with foreign Nations, to regulate Commerce among the several States, and to regulate Commerce with the Indian Tribes.

SECTION 6

The Judges, both of the Supreme and inferior Courts, shall hold their Offices during good Behaviour, and shall, at any time during their Continuance in Office, be removable by Impeachment.
