## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Seventeen.

### AN ACT

Relative to the Taking of Clams from Certain Flats in the  
Town of Winthrop.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives  
in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the  
same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. It shall be lawful for any person to dig  
2 and take clams from the flats on the shore of the town of  
3 Winthrop which lie easterly of a line drawn from the  
4 most southwesterly point of the shore of that part of said  
5 town of Winthrop called Court Park, in a generally  
6 southerly direction to the westerly end of Apple island,  
7 who shall be duly licensed by the board of health of said  
8 town.

1 SECTION 2. The board of health of the town of  
2 Winthrop may grant licenses to said persons as it may  
3 deem expedient, to dig and take clams on said flats  
4 within the limits of said town of Winthrop upon such  
5 conditions as said board may deem proper and may  
6 revoke said licenses at pleasure.

1 SECTION 3. This act shall take effect upon its passage.

The Commission of Messengers

to the Executive Branch of the Government

AN ACT

relating to the Office of Messengers of the House of Representatives  
Approved

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives  
in Congress assembled, and by the authority of the  
said House of Representatives

Section 1. It shall be lawful for any person to be  
employed as messenger in the House of Representatives  
who shall be certified by the House of Representatives  
to the Senate, and by the Senate to the House of Representatives  
as being qualified for the service of the House of Representatives  
and the Senate.

Section 2. The House of Representatives may  
employ such messengers as it may think proper  
and may determine the duties of such messengers  
and may determine the compensation of such messengers  
and may determine the term of service of such messengers  
and may determine the conditions of service of such messengers

Section 3. The act shall take effect upon its passage.
