Resolve accompanying the petition of William A. Kneeland relative to the protection and improvement of the banks of the Mystic lakes in the city of Medford and towns of Arlington and Winchester. Metropolitan Affairs. February 7.

RESOLVE

Directing the Metropolitan Park Commission to investigate the Subject of protecting the Mystic Lakes in the City of Medford and Towns of Arlington and Winchester, and of facilitating the Public Use of Said Lakes.

1 *Resolved*, That the metropolitan park commission be
2 directed to investigate the subject of protecting the banks
3 of the Mystic lakes in the city of Medford and towns of
4 Arlington and Winchester which are not already in public
5 ownership, and of protecting and purifying the water
6 supply of said lakes, and of facilitating the public use of
7 said lakes for recreation, fishing and other purposes, and
8 of preventing the pollution of said lakes and the sources
9 and tributaries thereof, and to report to the next general
10 court on the first Wednesday in January. For the pur-
11 pose of carrying out the provisions of this resolve, said
12 commission may expend a sum not exceeding one thou-
13 sand dollars from Metropolitan Parks and Maintenance
14 Fund.

RESOLVED

That the Board of Education be authorized to investigate the subject of providing for the education of the deaf and dumb in the State of Massachusetts, and to report thereon to the next session of the General Court.

And that the said Board be authorized to employ such persons as they may deem proper for the purpose of conducting the said investigation, and to pay to them such salaries and expenses as may be necessary for the purpose of such investigation, and to report thereon to the next session of the General Court.

The Commission of Government

AN ACT

To provide for the organization of a Commission of Government to study the Government of the United States and to report thereon to the President and the Congress.

Section 1. That there be organized a Commission of Government to study the Government of the United States and to report thereon to the President and the Congress.

Section 2. That the Commission of Government shall be organized as follows: (a) The Commission shall consist of seven members, to be appointed by the President, one of whom shall be the Chief Justice of the United States. (b) The Commission shall hold its first meeting within thirty days of the date of the appointment of its members. (c) The Commission shall report to the President and the Congress within six months of the date of its organization. (d) The Commission shall have the honor and respect of the Government. (e) The Commission shall have access to all the records and documents of the Government. (f) The Commission shall have the right to hold public hearings and to receive testimony from any person who may be interested in the subject matter of its study. (g) The Commission shall have the right to employ such personnel as it may deem necessary for the performance of its duties.
