AN ACT

To require the Licensing of Foreign Corporations engaged in the Business of Wrecking or Salvaging in the Navigable Waters of the Commonwealth.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. No foreign corporation shall engage in
2 the business of wrecking or salvaging in the navigable
3 waters of the commonwealth without first obtaining a
4 license therefor from the commission on waterways and
5 public lands. The license shall be granted upon the pay-
6 ment of a fee not to exceed twenty-five dollars per year
7 and shall run for one year.

1 SECTION 2. No such corporation as described in sec-
2 tion one shall engage in business in this commonwealth
3 without first providing a bond in an amount and with
4 sureties satisfactory to the commission on waterways and
5 public lands. Said bond shall run to the treasurer and
6 receiver general of the commonwealth and shall be con-
7 ditioned upon the payment by such corporation of such
8 amounts as shall be lawfully due to any parties for dam-

9 ages occasioned to person or property by acts of such cor-
10 poration or its agents or servants.

1 SECTION 3. Any such corporation violating the provi-
2 sions of this act shall be subject to a fine of not less than
3 fifty nor more than three hundred dollars for each
4 offence.
