

By Mr. Coyne of Boston, petition of John J. McCormack relative to regulating public laundries doing business in the Commonwealth. Legal Affairs. Jan. 16.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Five.

An Act to regulate Public Laundries doing Business in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. All laundries doing a public busi-
2 ness in the commonwealth of Massachusetts, shall
3 pay to the city or town treasurer, the sum of twen-
4 ty-five dollars on or before the first day of May
5 of each year, as a license fee to do business.

1 SECTION 2. All said laundries shall give a re-
2 ceipt in English enumerating the articles received.

1 SECTION 3. All articles not called for within
2 thirty days shall be posted and advertised for ten
3 days in said place of business, and if not called
4 for within the time, shall be sold at public sale.
5 Any surplus received after deducting expenses
6 shall be returned to the city or town treasurer
7 where said laundry is located.

1 SECTION 4. All charitable, and religious institu-
2 tions doing a laundry business in this common-
3 wealth are exempt from the operation of this bill.

1 SECTION 5. This act shall take effect upon its
2 passage.
