AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE CITY OF REVERE TO VOTE AT THE BIENNIAL STATE ELECTION IN THE CURRENT YEAR ON THE QUESTION OF ADOPTING THE "PLAN B" FORM OF CITY GOVERNMENT.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Notwithstanding the provisions of chapter forty-three of the  
 2 General Laws the following question shall be placed upon the  
 3 ballot to be used at the next biennial state election in the current  
 4 year: — "Shall the city of Revere adopt the form of government  
 5 defined as Plan B and consisting of government by a mayor and  
 6 councillors elected partly at large and partly from wards or dis-  
 7 tricts, with elections to be held biennially in every  
 8 odd-numbered year, according to chapter forty-three  
 9 of the General Laws relative to city charters?"

10 If a majority of the voters voting on said question vote in the  
 11 affirmative, the officers provided for under said Plan B shall be  
 12 elected in accordance with the provisions of chapter forty-three  
 13 of the General Laws relating to such plan and in accordance with  
 14 section fifteen thereof, and their terms of office shall begin at ten  
 15 o'clock in the forenoon on the first Monday of January following  
 16 their election, at which time said Plan B shall take full effect in  
 17 said city.
