The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Four.

AN ACT PROVIDING FOR THE REIMBURSEMENT OF CERTAIN PUBLIC EMPLOYEES FOUND INNOCENT OF CHARGES INSTIGATED BY CERTAIN AGENCIES OF THE COMMONWEALTH OR ITS SUB-DIVISIONS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 Notwithstanding any provision of law to the contrary, an
2 employee of the commonwealth or any political sub-division
3 thereof, either elective or appointive, who is indicted for cor-
4 rupt practices in government upon evidence furnished by a
5 governmental agency or by the commission established by chap-
6 ter one hundred and forty-six of the resolves of nineteen hun-
7 dred and sixty-two, shall, if found innocent after trial, be reim-
8 bursed by said commission for loss of salary sustained, court
9 costs and other reasonable expenses incurred because of said
10 indictment.
