AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE EXPENSES OF PROSECUTION OF CLAIMS FOR DEPOSIT AND DEFENSE AGAINST CLAIMS FOR REIMBURSEMENT UNDER THE WORKMEN'S COMPENSATION LAW OUT OF THE SPECIAL FUND FOR VETERANS IN THE DEPARTMENT OF THE STATE TREASURER.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 Section 65N of chapter 152 of the General Laws is hereby  
2 amended by adding at the end thereof the following:—

3 The reasonable expense of prosecution, if any, by the at-  
4 torney general, of claim for deposit under this section, shall,  
5 subject to the approval of the division, be payable out of the  
6 special fund established hereunder. The reasonable expense of  
7 defense, if any, by the attorney general, against claims for re-  
8 imbursement under sections twenty-six and thirty-seven A  
9 of this chapter, shall, subject to the approval of the division, be  
10 payable out of the special fund established hereunder.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES

ARTICLE I - THE LEGISLATIVE BRANCH

Section 1. All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Section 2. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors in that State.

Section 3. The Senate of the United States shall be composed of two Senators from each State, chosen by the Legislature thereof, for six Years; and each Senator shall have the Qualifications requisite for Senators in that State.

Section 4. The Times, Places and Manner of holding the Elections of Senators and Representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the Legislature thereof; but the Congress may at any time by Law alter or add to the Rules and Regulations therefor.

Section 5. The Congress shall assemble at least once in every Year, and such Meeting shall begin at noon on the 3d day of January, but they may adjourn to other Days within the same Year, and may, by Law, provide for the Calling of special Sessions thereof, which shall be held in pursuance of the Order of the Congress.

Section 6. The Congress shall have the sole Power of Taxing, Borrowing Money, and regulating Commerce with foreign Nations; and the Power of the Coinage and the Regulation of the Value of Money, and the Post Office and Post Roads, and the Office of Weights and Measures.

Section 7. All Bills for raising Revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as to the Form of such Bills. All Bills for the Appropriation of Money, and the Revenue from any Source, shall originate in the House of Representatives; but the Senate may propose or concur with Amendments as to the Form of such Bills.
