
By Mrs. Newman of Cambridge, petition of Albert E. Bates for legislation relative to the licensing of private business schools. Education.

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Four.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE LICENSING OF PRIVATE BUSINESS SCHOOLS.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 93 of the General Laws is hereby amended
2 by striking out section 21A and inserting a new section:—

3 *Section 21A.* The term “private trade school” shall, in sec-
4 tions twenty-one to twenty-one D, inclusive, mean a school
5 maintained, or classes conducted, for the purpose of teaching
6 any business, trade or industrial occupation for profit or for a
7 tuition charge, but shall not include a school or college regularly
8 chartered and authorized by the laws of the commonwealth to
9 grant degrees, an endowed school which offers approved courses
10 without profit, or a school exclusively engaged in training physi-
11 cally handicapped persons or a school conducted by any person
12 for the education and training of his own employees. In the
13 licensing of new schools or the acceptance of new courses, the
14 requirements with respect to courses of instruction in the appren-
15 ticeable skilled trades shall be determined by the board of
16 education with the advice of the department of labor and in-
17 dustries.

1 SECTION 2. Section 22 of said chapter 93, as most recently
2 amended by section 3 of chapter 583 of the acts of 1941, is hereby
3 further amended by adding after the word “correspondence” in
4 line 3 the words:— or trade.
