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## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

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In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Four.

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AN ACT PROVIDING FOR LIFE TENURE FOR CLARENCE SYRIAC, INCUMBENT OF THE OFFICE OF SUPERINTENDENT OF HIGHWAYS IN THE TOWN OF LUDLOW.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 The tenure of office of Clarence Syriac, the present incumbent  
2 of the office of superintendent of highways in the town of Lud-  
3 low, shall be unlimited, but he may be removed therefrom for  
4 cause after hearing in the manner provided by section forty-three  
5 of chapter thirty-one of the General Laws.

### The Constitution of the United States

Article I, Section 1

All legislative Powers herein granted shall be vested in a Congress of the United States, which shall consist of a Senate and House of Representatives.

Representatives and direct Taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be admitted to or separated from the Union, on the basis of one Representative for every thirty thousand Persons; but each State shall have at least one Representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the States shall be apportioned to Representatives on the basis of the best Information which can be obtained.

1. The House of Representatives shall be composed of Members chosen every second Year by the People of the several States, and the Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
2. No Person shall be a Representative who shall not have attained to the Age of twenty five Years, seven Years, and be seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been seven Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.
3. The Electors in each State shall have the Qualifications requisite for Electors of the most numerous Branch of the State Legislature.
4. No State shall appoint two Senators in the same Year.
5. No Person shall be a Senator who shall not have attained to the Age of thirty Years, and been seven Years a Citizen of the United States, and when elected shall have been three Years a Citizen of that State in which he shall be chosen.
6. The Senate shall have the sole Power to try all Impeachments, when the President is absent, and when the Chief Justice is absent, and the majority of the Members present shall determine the Issue, and no Person shall be convicted without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.
7. The Senate shall have the sole Power to confirm and reject all Appointments, and all Commissions shall be in the Name and under the Great Seal of the United States.
8. The Senate shall have the sole Power to ratify and reject all Treaties, made by the President and Senators, and no Treaty shall be ratified without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.
9. The Senate shall have the sole Power to ratify and reject all Appointments, and all Commissions shall be in the Name and under the Great Seal of the United States.
10. The Senate shall have the sole Power to ratify and reject all Treaties, made by the President and Senators, and no Treaty shall be ratified without the Concurrence of two thirds of the Members present.
