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MEMORANDUM OF THE SECRETARY OF THE COMMONWEALTH PURSUANT TO GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 3, SECTION 7, WITH RESPECT TO PETITION OF JOHN P. KENNEDY RELATIVE TO THE CORPORATE POWERS OF THE EVERETT POLICE MUTUAL AID ASSOCIATION, INCORPORATED.

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JANUARY 16, 1964.

*To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives.*

The above-named petition was transmitted to me by the Clerk of the House of Representatives on December 30, 1963, with a request for a memorandum.

Everett Police Mutual Aid Association, Inc. was organized as a corporation under the Acts of 1911, chapter 628, section 12, on June 21, 1917, for the purpose of paying death benefits not exceeding \$500 and disability benefits not exceeding \$20 per week; the membership being limited to employees and ex-employees of the Police Department of the City of Everett. On March 5, 1926, a Change of Purpose was filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth raising the amount of death benefits to be paid by the corporation to an amount not exceeding \$1,000 and disability benefits to an amount not exceeding \$25 per week; membership to be limited to employees and ex-employees of the Police Department of the City of Everett. On October 14, 1949, a Change of Purpose was filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth raising the amount of death benefits to be paid by the corporation to an amount not exceeding \$1,500 and disability benefits not exceeding \$25 per week; membership to be limited to employees and ex-employees of the Police Department of the City of Everett. Chapter 32 of the Acts of 1950 authorized the corporation

upon the retirement of any member in good standing, to pay to such member such sum, not exceeding five hundred dollars, as may be determined by vote of said corporation. On September 28, 1959, a Change of Purpose was filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth raising the amount of death benefits to be paid by the corporation to an amount not exceeding \$2,000 and disability benefits to an amount not exceeding \$25 per week; membership to be limited to employees and ex-employees of the Police Department of the City of Everett. On November 20, 1963, a Change of Purpose was filed in the Office of the Secretary of the Commonwealth raising the amount of death benefits to be paid by the corporation to an amount not exceeding \$4,000 and disability benefits to an amount not exceeding \$25 per week; membership to be limited to permanent and retired male members of the Everett Police Department.

The bill which accompanies the above petition seeks to amend chapter 32 of the Acts of 1950 by striking out, in line 5, the words "five hundred" and inserting in place thereof the words:— one thousand.

It is respectfully suggested that an opinion of the Commissioner of Insurance be sought on this bill.

No fee is required to be paid by a corporation of this type under the provisions of chapter 3, section 7.
