Accompanying the fourth recommendation of the Department of Public Works (House, No. 113). Highways and Motor Vehicles.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Seven.

AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS AND REGISTRY OF MOTOR VEHICLES, IN CERTAIN CASES, TO REVOKE A CITY OR TOWN SPEED REGULATION CERTIFICATION.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 The first paragraph of section 18 of chapter 90 of the General
2 Laws is hereby amended by striking out the last sentence and
3 inserting in place thereof the following sentence:—No special
4 speed regulation shall be effective after a certification of con-
5 sistency with public interests has been revoked by the depart-
6 ment and the registrar acting jointly and any sign purporting
7 to establish a speed limit which is not installed and maintained
8 in accordance with a certification may be removed by or under
9 the direction of the department.

The Commission of Investigation

AN ACT TO ESTABLISH A COMMISSION OF INVESTIGATION TO INQUIRE INTO THE CAUSES OF THE FAILURE OF THE BANK OF AMERICA IN 1930, AND TO REPORT THEREON TO THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

SECTION 1. That the Commission of Investigation be and it is hereby established to inquire into the causes of the failure of the Bank of America in 1930, and to report thereon to the House of Representatives.

SECTION 2. That the Commission of Investigation be composed of seven members to be appointed by the House of Representatives, and that the Commission be organized as soon as possible after the passage of this Act.

SECTION 3. That the Commission of Investigation be authorized to employ such clerical and other personnel as may be necessary for the proper conduct of its business, and that the Commission be authorized to receive such funds as may be necessary for the proper conduct of its business.

SECTION 4. That the Commission of Investigation be authorized to hold public hearings, and to receive and consider such evidence as may be presented to it.

SECTION 5. That the Commission of Investigation be authorized to make such reports as it may deem proper to the House of Representatives.

SECTION 6. That the Commission of Investigation be authorized to make such recommendations as it may deem proper to the House of Representatives.

SECTION 7. That the Commission of Investigation be authorized to make such other and sundry provisions as may be necessary for the proper conduct of its business.
