AN ACT AUTHORIZING THE TRAFFIC COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF  
NEWTON TO ADOPT TEMPORARY TRAFFIC REGULATIONS.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in  
General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as  
follows:*

1 SECTION 1. The traffic commission of the city of Newton  
2 established pursuant to article twelve of the Revised Ordin-  
3 ances of Newton, Massachusetts, nineteen hundred and sixty-  
4 five, as amended, is hereby authorized to adopt regulations  
5 governing the operation, stopping and standing of carriages  
6 or vehicles in said city to the full extent that the board of  
7 aldermen in said city has the power to adopt ordinances  
8 governing the same, and subject to all limitations imposed by  
9 law on the adoption of such ordinances, which regulations  
10 shall have the force of ordinances of said city for a period of  
11 sixty days, or such shorter period as may be provided by any  
12 such regulation, from the effective date thereof. No such  
13 regulation shall be effective until a copy thereof attested by  
14 the secretary of said commission shall have been filed with  
15 the city clerk of said city. Each such regulation shall be  
16 subject to modification or repeal by the board of aldermen of  
17 said city at any time subsequent to its adoption.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall become effective upon its  
2 acceptance at any time during the calendar year nineteen  
3 hundred and sixty-seven by the board of aldermen of the city  
4 of Newton subject to the provisions of the charter of said  
5 city.

Resolved, That the Committee on the Judiciary be and they are authorized to report to the House the following bill, with amendments thereunto, for passage:

### The Commission on the Judiciary

Enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, February 1, 1957.

Section 1. That the Commission on the Judiciary be and it is hereby authorized to study and report to the House and Senate on the organization and functioning of the Federal Judiciary, including the Supreme Court, the Courts of Appeals, the District Courts, and the Federal Magistrate Courts.

Section 2. That the Commission on the Judiciary be and it is hereby authorized to hold such public hearings and to employ such personnel as it may deem necessary and appropriate for the purpose of carrying out its duties.

Section 3. That the Commission on the Judiciary be and it is hereby authorized to report to the House and Senate on or before the first day of May, 1958, a report containing its findings and recommendations with respect to the organization and functioning of the Federal Judiciary, including the Supreme Court, the Courts of Appeals, the District Courts, and the Federal Magistrate Courts, and to such other matters as may be deemed appropriate by the Commission.

Section 4. That the Commission on the Judiciary be and it is hereby authorized to submit to the House and Senate such recommendations as it may deem appropriate for the purpose of carrying out its duties, and that the Commission be and it is hereby authorized to report to the House and Senate on or before the first day of May, 1958, a report containing its findings and recommendations with respect to the organization and functioning of the Federal Judiciary, including the Supreme Court, the Courts of Appeals, the District Courts, and the Federal Magistrate Courts, and to such other matters as may be deemed appropriate by the Commission.

Section 5. That the Commission on the Judiciary be and it is hereby authorized to submit to the House and Senate such recommendations as it may deem appropriate for the purpose of carrying out its duties, and that the Commission be and it is hereby authorized to report to the House and Senate on or before the first day of May, 1958, a report containing its findings and recommendations with respect to the organization and functioning of the Federal Judiciary, including the Supreme Court, the Courts of Appeals, the District Courts, and the Federal Magistrate Courts, and to such other matters as may be deemed appropriate by the Commission.
