By Mr. Walsh of Boston, petition of the Boston Teachers Union, Local No. 66, AFL-CIO, for legislation to provide a retirement allowance of seventy-five per cent of average salary for public employees with thirty years of creditable service. Public Service.

AN ACT RELATIVE TO THE RETIREMENT ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN PUBLIC EMPLOYEES.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any provision of chapter
2 thirty-two of the General Laws to the contrary, any employee
3 of the commonwealth or any of its political subdivisions who
4 is a member of a contributory or non-contributory retirement
5 system and who has attained thirty years of creditable service
6 as defined in said chapter thirty-two shall, regardless of age,
7 be entitled to a retirement allowance which is equal to
8 seventy-five per cent of his average salary. The average
9 salary shall be computed from the two highest years for
10 which an employee received salary from the commonwealth
11 or any political subdivision.

1 SECTION 2. Nothing in this act shall adversely affect the
2 retirement allowance of any employee under any other sec-
3 tion of chapter thirty-two.
