

# HOUSE . . . . . No. 3683

By Mr. Ahearn of Norwood, petition of David C. Ahearn, Alan Paul Danovitch and John M. Quinlan (by vote of the town) that certain applicants who do not meet maximum age requirements shall be eligible for appointment as police officers in the town of Foxborough. Local Affairs.

## The Commonwealth of Massachusetts

In the Year One Thousand Nine Hundred and Sixty-Eight.

AN ACT PROVIDING THAT CERTAIN APPLICANTS WHO DO NOT MEET CERTAIN MAXIMUM AGE REQUIREMENTS SHALL BE ELIGIBLE FOR APPOINTMENT AS POLICE OFFICERS IN THE TOWN OF FOXBOROUGH.

*Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:*

1 SECTION 1. Notwithstanding any provision of law to the  
2 contrary regulating the maximum age of applicants for the  
3 position of police officer, applicants in the next open competi-  
4 tive examination for police officers in the town of Foxborough  
5 who meet all other requirements shall be eligible for certifica-  
6 tion and appointment provided they have not reached the age  
7 of thirty-nine at the time such examination is taken.

1 SECTION 2. This act shall take effect upon its acceptance by  
2 the town of Foxborough.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE

ARTICLE I. OF THE CONSTITUTION

SECTION 1. The legislative power shall be vested in a Senate and House of Representatives, which shall be styled the General Assembly. The Senate shall be composed of twelve members, and the House of Representatives of twenty members, who shall be chosen for the term of two years, and shall meet on the first Monday of January next following the election of the Representatives.

SECTION 2. The Senators and Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors of the State, and shall hold their offices for the term of two years, and shall be eligible for re-election.

SECTION 3. The House of Representatives shall be apportioned among the several counties of the State, according to the number of qualified electors in each county, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SECTION 4. The Senate shall have the sole power of impeachment, and shall try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose, they shall be on oath or affirmation. No person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

SECTION 5. The General Assembly shall assemble on the first Monday of January next following the election of the Representatives, and shall meet on the same day in every subsequent year, unless otherwise provided by law.

SECTION 6. The General Assembly shall have the power to pass bills for the raising and appropriation of money, and to regulate the public debt of the State.

SECTION 8. This article shall take effect upon its ratification by the people of the State.
